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Award winning journalist Stacey Butler joined CBS 2 and KCAL 9 in June 2004.

In 2010, Butler won an Emmy for her reports from Fort Irwin in the Mojave Desert, where she spent several days in the simulated Iraqi town of Medina Wasl as U.S. soldiers trained for missions in Iraq.

She is also the recipient of a Golden Mike award for her feature reporting on middle-age women who uprooted their lives and moved to Mexico.

Butler has also reported extensively on the secretive polygamous sect in Colorado City, Arizona that was run by former FBI fugitive Warren Jeffs.

Butler joined CBS 2 and KCAL 9 after spending five years as a general assignment reporter for KSL-TV, the NBC affiliate in Salt Lake City. While there, she won a regional Edward R. Murrow Award for her coverage of an Olympic hopeful's battle with a rare cancer.

A Bay Area native, Butler attended Loyola Marymount University and following graduation began her television career at KRCR-TV, the ABC station in Redding, California.
