
IN MEMORY

On July 2, Ricky Sandoval lost his three-year battle against pancreatic cancer. Soon after his diagnosis, Ricky's wife, Gael, founded the Detroit Affiliate. Together, Gael and Ricky worked steadfastly to raise awareness for the disease. Ricky fought a courageous battle and was an inspiration to all who met him.

Ricky, who was the longtime director of security for the Detroit Lions, was named the Lions' first non-player nominee and winner of the NFL's Ed Block Courage Award in 2006, which is given to a member of

each of the league's 32 teams. The Lions have renamed their practice field "Sandoval Field" in his honor.

PanCAN HITS CAPITOL HILL



Detroit Affiliate members met with U.S. Congresswoman Debbie Stabenow on Capitol Hill and urged her to support increased funding for pancreatic cancer research.

On March 31,14 of our affiliate members joined nearly 500 advocates from across the country to participate in the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network's 3rd Annual Advocacy Day in Washington, D.C.

We met with our Congressional representatives and asked for their support by co-sponsoring the Pancreatic Cancer Research and Education Act (H.R. 745). This bill would provide the National Cancer Institute (NCI) with the tools it needs to make true progress in the fight against pancreatic cancer. By July, 156 co-sponsors have now signed on to the bill, including three Michigan delegates: Rep. Candice Miller, Rep. Thaddeus McCotter and Rep. Gary Peters. (Note: The legislation has not yet been introduced in the Senate).

In addition to our request to Members of Congress to co-sponsor the Pancreatic Cancer Research and Education Act., we also asked our legislators to co-sign the Cummings-Platt letter, which urges Congress to double the budget of the National Cancer Institute over the next five years by increasing the funding to \$6 billion in FY 2010, an increase of 20% over FY 2009. Sixty members of Congress signed on to the Cummings-Platt letter, including two Michigan delegates: Rep. Dale Kildee and Rep. Fred Upton.

On June 1, we held our 3rd Annual Links For A Cure golf fundraiser at Tam-O-Shanter Country Club in West Bloomfield. We raised almost \$50,000 to help in the fight against pancreatic cancer.

Marina's specialty is Notch Signaling in Pancreatic Cancer Initiation and Progression.

Twenty years ago I lost my grandma, Helen Jagielski, to pancreatic cancer. Her story is not unlike many others, diagnosed at a late stage, given no options, passed away 3 months later.
